# ABOUT ASIAN UNDERGRADUATE SYMPOSIUM

The Asian Undergraduate Symposium (AUS) is a two-week programme organised by NUS College (NUSC) that brings together undergraduates from Singapore and Asian regions, with a special focus on ASEAN participants for cultural exchange, networking, and capacity development.

A part of the AUN Summer Camp Programme, AUS includes more than 300 participants: NUSC undergraduates, tertiary students from Singapore, undergraduates from the Asian University Network (AUN), other ASEAN states and from China, India, Japan and South Korea.

Initiated in 2015 as the Asian Undergraduate Summit, AUS aimed to build a platform for undergraduates across Asia from various disciplines to come together and engage in meaningful academic and intercultural exchange.

In 2023, AUS grew to become the Asian Undergraduate Symposium. In this form, the AUS programme runs on the I-4 Model – Inspire, Ideate, Intercultural and Implement – to empower participants to transform academic discourse into practical solutions for real-world challenges while building lasting networks across Asia.

For 2025, AUS will focus on the theme of 'Interconnected Communities' with three sub-themes: Environment & Sustainability, Diversity, Equity & Inclusion, as well as Heritage & Culture. AUS is also excited to partner with the inaugural Regen Asia Summit (RAS) which will introduce participants to the broader concept of Regeneration and also give participants opportunities to engage and network with 100 impact leaders from around the world.

- Heritage and Culture



#### Day 2: Sustainability and Regeneration



(Moderator)

#### **Associate Professor Adrian Loo**

Associate Professor Adrian Loo is a conservation biologist and Deputy Director, Centre for Nature-based Climate Solutions. He held appointments in the National Parks Board, Singapore as Group Director for Wildlife Management and Senior Director for Community Projects, Group Director Conservation and Director, Terrestrial, National Biodiversity Centre. He led human-wildlife conflicts reduce science-based management, education and community Working with international partners, he led stewardship. efforts in fighting illegal wildlife trade through enforcement and wildlife forensics. He oversaw species recovery programmes and habitat enhancement projects in Singapore. He is the mentor for the CITES Global Youth Network engaging youth in the protection of endangered species from unsustainable trade and illegal wildlife trade.



#### **Dr. Farrah Shameen**

Dr. Farrah Shameen leads the Malaysian Timber Certification Council (MTCC) as CEO since September 2023, promoting sustainable forest management and timber certification in Malaysia. Her focus is on MTCS credibility and global recognition, aiding market access for sustainable timber and value chains while ensuring stakeholders uphold sustainability. Previously, she gained deep insights into policymaking, environmental governance, and international cooperation as an Administrative and Diplomatic Officer in the Malaysian government. This role involved policy formulation. collaboration, and international negotiations.

Her expertise extends to forestry administration and international wildlife trade regulation through her work with CITES. This experience navigating international agreements and national policies offers a unique perspective on sustainable forestry and standard setting.

#### Day 2: Sustainability and Regeneration



#### Ms. Sam Shu Qin

Sam is a marine conservationist dedicated to restoring coral reefs in Southeast Asia. Her work focuses on enhancing biodiversity on artificial structures, rehabilitating degraded reefs in urban marine environments, and collaborating with coastal communities on restoration initiatives. She is also the co-founder of Our Singapore Reefs, an initiative that raises awareness of Singapore's marine biodiversity while fostering community collaboration and engagement in marine science and conservation. Through her expertise in science communication, Sam inspires diverse audiences to take an active role in marine stewardship. She is also currently teaching in NUS College, working on interdisciplinary projects, and collaborating with communities in Indonesia on marine conservation with undergraduates.



#### Dr. Supatchaya Techachoochert

Supatchaya Techachoochert is an ecologist and climate action advocate dedicated to forest and biodiversity protection. With a PhD in Biology from Mahidol University, her research focused on conserving the endangered Giant Nuthatch. She currently leads the "Carbon Credit from Community Forests for Sustainability" project at Mae Fah Luang Foundation, supporting local communities in safeguarding forests while generating sustainable income through carbon markets. Her work spans ecosystem restoration, climate adaptation, and policy engagement. Passionate about inspiring young scientists, she advocates for nature-based solutions, emphasizing the vital role of biodiversity conservation in addressing global environmental challenges.

#### Day 3: Diversity, Equity and Inclusion



(Moderator)

#### **Associate Professor Eleanor Wong**

Associate Professor Eleanor Wong, a graduate of NUS Faculty of Law, returned in 2002 to launch its Legal Skills Programme as Director. At the Law Faculty, she serves as a member of the Leadership Team, Co-Director of the Centre for Pro Bono and Clinical Legal Education, and Co-ordinator of the International Moot Programme. She holds positions as NUS Associate Provost (Special Projects) and Dean of the Singapore Institute of Legal Education. Concurrently, as Vice Dean (Residential Programmes & Enrichment) at NUS College, she oversees the residential program, ensuring an enriching experience, covering student life, pastoral care, and discipline. Additionally, she continues her links to industry as a Consultant with Helmsman LLC and is a published playwright and poet.



#### **Dr. Bjorn Gomes**

Dr. Bjorn Gomes is the Deputy Director of the Global Pathways Programme and one of the Pillar Heads of the Global Social Thought course at NUS College. He received his PhD in Political Science (Political Theory/International Relations) from Columbia University. His research focuses on the struggle for recognition in modern political thought, as well as subjects falling within the fields of political theory and international relations.

### Day 3: Diversity, Equity and Inclusion



#### Mr. Narash Narasimman

Narasimman is the co-founder of Impart Ltd, a local charity that enables youths to foster ecosystems of care spanning across 3 arms namely Education, Mental Health Care, and Community. For the past 19 years, he has worked with children, adolescents, young adults and their families. His work ranges from running developmental programmes for youths in the community, to rehabilitating and reintegrating youths known to juvenile justice systems and statutory care.

Examples of his past work include pioneering a community-based aftercare program and community-based addiction management service – a testament to his expertise and experience in community-focused models of care. His recent work includes interweaves group therapy with traditional boxing and fitness training to bring a programme that marries the best of mind and body care.



#### **Professor Bumsoo Kim**

Professor Bumsoo Kim is a professor of College of Liberal Studies at Seoul National University (SNU) in Seoul, Korea. He received his Ph.D. in political science from the University of Chicago in 2006 and M.A. and B.A. in political science from Seoul National University. His research focuses on justice and equality, multiculturalism, human rights, and so on. He published many articles and books, including What Is Fairness in Korean Society? (2022) and The Politics of Translation in Modern Japan (2023). He is now serving as Director of the Institute for Peace and Unification Studies at SNU and as President of the Korean Political Science Association.

#### Day 4: Heritage and Culture



(Moderator)

#### Ms. Chang Yueh-Siang

Siang occupies a very interesting practice-and-teaching role in NUS, being both Associate University Curator at the NUS Museum, as well as Adjunct Lecturer at NUS College, teaching a course on heritage management and approaches, "Curating" Singapore: Museums, Heritage and Spaces. She also leads Impact Experience fieldwork projects to Penang, Bandung and islands in Indonesia, supervising student projects that pertain to living and intangible cultural heritages, always considering the interaction of heritage with urban development issues. While Siang has also had experiences working in national and international museums, she is currently paying attention to the question of how intangible knowledges and practices may be retained and expressed within their contexts.



#### Dr. Ng Keng-Khoon

Dr. Keng-Khoon Ng is a faculty at NUS College, National University of Singapore. His research areas include architecture, the politics of urban change in Southeast Asian cities, and topics relating to cultural heritage conservation. 'Bajautopia: Tales of Borneo's Sea Nomads' is his latest edited book in which he advocates the rights of undocumented indigenous Bajau Laut living in Malaysian Borneo and the architectural imaginations of their futures. At NUS College, he supervises student groups to undertake Impact Experience Projects, a 2-year capstone service-learning module, in Sabah Malaysia, focusing on the themes such as infrastructure improvement, waste management, and community-driven tourism.

#### Day 4: Heritage and Culture



#### Ms. Khoo Salma

Khoo Salma is a Penang-based writer, publisher and past President of the Penang Heritage Trust. She is co-founder of Areca Books, a small publishing house and bookshop, and custodian of the Sun Yat Sen Museum Penang, both located in the George Town World Heritage Site. She has written or co-written more than a dozen books, including The Chulia in Penang, which won a Book Prize at the International Conference of Asia Scholars (ICAS, 2015). More recently, she has spoken at the Khazanah Megatrends Forum, Kuala Lumpur (2023) and as a Miles Lewis Fellow at the University of Melbourne (2024).



#### Mr. Kwek Li Yong

Kwek Li Yong is one of Singapore's recognisable heritage researcher who is a strong advocate for a community-centric approach to arts and heritage. He is the Founder of My Community, a non-profit organisation which specialises in community-based research and documentation to preserve memories and organises auided neighbourhood festivals to celebrate the everyday people, places and practices in our communities. He has provided independent research and assessments on Dakota Crescent, Tanglin Halt and Pulau Ubin for government agencies the National Heritage Board and Urban includina Redevelopment Authority. He holds a Master degree in Heritage and Museum Studies from The University of Sydney and is the author of many publications on community heritage and festivals

#### **Regeneration Workshop**



#### Ms. Bernise Ang

Bernise Ang is Chief Alchemist at Zeroth Labs, establishing systems thinking and complexity science as core disciplines. In the firm's international development practice, she led UNDP Asia Pacific's first systems thinking research approach to advise the Bhutanese government on youth unemployment. Her academic engagements include co-developing the Complexity & Systems Thinking (CAST) summer programme for NUS Medicine, and the module "Systems Thinking for Wicked Problems" for Residential College 4, where she is a Fellow. Her research interests include the application of network science to stability and urban dynamics.

Bernise has spoken on urban innovation and systems thinking at Harvard Business School, SXSW, and the World Economic Forum. Previously, she worked in private equity specialising in REITs and co-founded Syinc, a youth nonprofit in Singapore. She is an Obama Scholar, an Asia 21 Young Leader, and a Young Global Leader of the World Economic Forum.

#### **Regeneration Workshop**



#### Mr. Shaun Koh

Shaun Koh is Chief Strategist at Zeroth Labs, leading institutional engagements with corporate, higher education, and multilateral partners. He led development of an urban innovation framework for UNDP Asia Pacific, which has been rolled out in 14 country offices. His adjunct faculty experience includes teaching public service innovation at SMU's Master of Tri-Sector Collaboration, regeneration and sustainability at NUS College, and complexity science & systems thinking at the NUS Yong Loo Lin School of Medicine. He is also Chief Facilitator for the Regen Asia Summit 2025.

Shaun has guest lectured at the Civil Service College, training senior civil servants in Singapore. He also served as facilitator for a scenario planning project with Nagasaki University (Pandemic Futures and Nuclear Weapons Risks) and has trained emerging political leaders at Apolitical Academy Caucasus in strategic foresight. Shaun brings his background in computer engineering together with systems thinking methods to support corporate, government and multilateral partners to be future-ready.

#### **Ms. Rachel Phoon**

Rachel Phoon is the Head of Alumni Relations and Development at NUS College, with over 25 years of experience in the non-profit, healthcare, and education sectors. A passionate advocate for youth empowerment, she has built impactful partnerships supporting young people's growth. Rachel has held development roles in Hong Kong, Malaysia, and Singapore, including at United World College of South East Asia and Yale-NUS College. She serves on the board of CARE Singapore, supporting at-risk youths, and was Co-Programme Lead at the 2023 Asian Undergraduate Symposium. Rachel is dedicated to helping young people thrive and become catalysts for positive change.

#### **Dr. Aaron Maniam**

Aaron Maniam is Fellow of Practice and Director, Digital Transformation Education at the University of Oxford's Blavatnik School of Government. He works on how large, complex organisations like governments can (i) better use, regulate and enable digital technology in a range of domains, and (ii) plan more effectively for the long-term.

Previously a Singaporean civil servant, he held several policy leadership roles, including starting both the Centre for Strategic Futures, which examines long-range trends, and the Civil Service College Applied Simulation Training (CAST) Laboratory, which creates serious games to help policymakers grapple with wicked problems. He co-chaired the World Economic Forum's Global Future Council on the Future of Technology Policy (2022-2024), and now co-chairs the GFC on GovTech and Digital Public Infrastructure. He is a Senior Fellow of the Centre for Future Generations, a Brussels-based think-and-do tank, and a member of the OECD's Expert Group on Artificial Intelligence (AI) Futures. His PhD, also from Oxford's Blavatnik School, compared the digitalisation of tax and social policy agencies in Estonia, Zealand and Singapore.


